



## **A call to the People of the Land and Soil**

**Let it be known and placed upon the public record that The South African Assembly enters this next chapter with renewed purpose, energy and commitment to the People, the Land and the Soil of South Africa.**

This renewed objective follows the recent affirmation and statements made by **Anna von Reitz** concerning **The South African Assembly** and the efforts of South Africans to organize themselves through an Assembly process.

For many people, the subjects of Land and Soil, political status, inheritance, jurisdiction, and self-government may initially appear complex. These are not subjects commonly taught or discussed in ordinary life, and no person should be diminished simply because they have not previously encountered or understood them.

People come to the Assembly carrying different experiences, knowledge, abilities, and questions.

Every honest contribution has value.

Our task is therefore not to create another structure of personal authority or control. It is to **learn, investigate, document, organize, cooperate and build together.**

### **The affirmation that renews our purpose**

The General Assembly specifically draws attention to the statements attributed to **Anna von Reitz in Article 5919**, which have provided renewed energy and focus to the objectives of The South African Assembly.

**Among the statements published in that article are the following:**

*"Of course, they don't want to see **The South African Assembly** succeed. And they don't want to pay the South African people what they are owed, either. They would rather enroll them as Territorial British Subjects, and dole out welfare entitlement payments, instead of releasing their inheritance and walking away."*

**The article further refers to parties who:**

*"...may or may not have understood the self-interest of the British Crown Corporation in trying to undermine South African efforts to organize their own actual government via The South African Assembly."*

**Most importantly for the direction of our work, the article states:**

*"If you want your own unincorporated government, you are going to have to organize it through **The South Africa Assembly process**, get everyone to declare their birthright standing on the land and soil of South Africa, and work together to claim back your country and your birthright inheritance."*

These extracts are reproduced as statements made in the referenced publication. Their inclusion in this Public Notice records the position expressed by **Anna von Reitz**; it should not be read as independent legal proof of the underlying propositions.

For **The South African Assembly**, however, this affirmation has brought renewed focus to the work before us.

It reminds us that recognition is not the completion of our work.

**It is a call to greater responsibility.**



### **From recognition to responsibility**

If we believe that the People have a responsibility toward their Land, Soil and inheritance, then we must demonstrate that responsibility through our conduct.

- We must be capable of organizing with honour.
- We must maintain credible records.
- We must educate ourselves.
- We must question and verify information.
- We must establish transparent processes.

And we must learn to **work together** despite differences of **opinion, personality and background**.

- No Coordinator owns the Assembly.
- No Officer stands above the People.
- No title should become an instrument of personal authority.

Those serving in Assembly positions must understand that leadership is **service, responsibility and accountability**.

The strength of **The South African Assembly** will therefore not ultimately be determined by how loudly we proclaim our position.

It will be determined by the **integrity of our People, the quality of our records, the competence of our structures and the manner in which we conduct ourselves**.

### **From confusion to understanding**

We do not expect every South African arriving at the Assembly to already understand Land and Soil jurisdiction, political status, inheritance or Assembly processes.

**We ask instead that people come willing to learn.**

- Study the history.
- Examine the records.
- Read the documents.
- Understand the Assembly process.
- Ask difficult questions.
- Challenge assumptions respectfully.
- Verify information wherever possible.
- Share knowledge without arrogance.
- And never be afraid to say, **“I do not yet understand.”**

There is no shame in not knowing.



**The responsibility begins when we choose whether or not to learn.**

The Assembly must become a place where sincere questions are welcomed and where claims capable of verification are examined carefully.

- Those who disagree with us are not automatically our enemies.
- Those who question us are not automatically opponents.
- Those who remain uncertain should not be condemned.

Our answer must be **education, evidence, discussion, transparency, and properly maintained Public Records.**

**The Assembly needs the People**

**The South African Assembly** therefore calls upon South Africans possessing knowledge, experience, skills and a willingness to serve to step forward.

- We need researchers and educators.
- We need Record Keepers.
- We need communicators.
- We need people experienced in administration, technology, finance and organization.
- We need men and women prepared to help build the national, provincial/district and local/canton Assembly structures.
- We need people prepared to teach.
- We need people prepared to learn.

Most importantly, we need people who understand that **building something for the People is fundamentally different from building something for personal power.**

The Assembly cannot be built by spectators alone.

It requires participation.

**Our responsibility to the Land and Soil**

- If we speak of inheritance, we must accept the responsibility that accompanies inheritance.
- If we speak of self-government, we must demonstrate that we are capable of governing ourselves.
- If we speak of the People, the welfare and lawful interests of the People must come before personal ambition.
- If we speak of Assembly, then we must actually learn how to assemble, deliberate, record decisions, resolve disagreements and work together.
- And if we speak of future generations, we must build something worthy of leaving behind.

The Land is more than a slogan.

The Soil is more than terminology.

Inheritance is more than something to be claimed.

**Inheritance carries responsibility.**

Our objective must therefore extend beyond speaking about freedom.

We must build the knowledge, records, processes, institutions and competent participation necessary to responsibly carry that freedom forward.



### **The work begins with us**

Do not wait for someone else to build The South African Assembly.

#### **The People are the Assembly.**

- Come with your knowledge.
- Come with your questions.
- Come with your experience.
- Come with your doubts.
- Come with your willingness to investigate.
- Come with your willingness to learn.

#### **And come prepared to contribute.**

- Let us replace confusion with understanding.
- Let us replace division with constructive deliberation.
- Let us replace personalities with principles.
- Let us replace speculation with properly maintained records.
- Let us replace waiting with building.

### **A new chapter**

This moment represents an opportunity for **The South African Assembly**.

The affirmation expressed by Anna von Reitz concerning South Africans organizing through The South African Assembly has renewed our determination to move forward with greater focus and purpose.

#### **But what happens next depends upon us.**
